From the Curate's Desk

Almighty God, whose loving hand hath given us all that we possess: Grant us grace that we may honor thee with our substance, and, remembering the account which we must one day give, may be faithful stewards of thy bounty, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP p. 827)

In this season of harvest, I feel it is appropriate to honor God for the abundance we have been given this year, so here it goes: At our home, we had gigantic blackberries and juicy blueberries that produced fruit for almost three months! We made enough jams and jellies to last the rest of the year, and we had more than enough to share with our friends and neighbors. Thank you, God, for such a gift! It is also important to recognize our call to be faithful servants of God's bounty. For our family, this will include a substantial amount of mulching, some pruning, and the creation of windbreaks if we have a particularly cold winter. This takes time, work, money, and planning. But, oh my goodness, those berries were delicious this year, let's do more of that!

On Sunday, September 18, I was moved by the words of the always thoughtful and committed high schooler, Danielle Pharr. Danielle is a person whom I have come to very much honor and respect in the almost year and a half that I have served at St. John. Danielle is a pledging member, and she gave a powerful message about what being a Christian and a member here has meant to her. She spoke about being Confirmed as an Episcopalian, the sense of community that comes with making this informed commitment to her faith, and the abundant opportunities to learn about and grow in her faith here at St. John in the Wilderness. Danielle has made a financial commitment to give what she can to support the mission of St. John, and she invited all of us to recognize that the abundance of opportunities and blessings that we encounter go hand-inhand with our call to practice meaningful, intentional stewardship of God's gifts.



As we move through this agricultural season of harvest, we are also called to recognize the seasons of harvest throughout our lives and in the life of the Church. In the past year at St. John in the Wilderness, we have added dozens of new members, baptized and received others, hosted nearly 75 children for Creation Care Camp, and listened to stories and music together with the "Friends of Music" series. We hiked, gardened, and blessed animals together. We packed thousands of meals for refugees across the world and hungry children right here in Henderson County. We ate, danced, laughed, and cried together. We have buried beloved members of our community and visited those in need of comfort and care. I got to marry a 93- and 92-year-old! We have worshiped and taken communion together, and all of this to the glory of God in Christ Iesus.

We will continue to do these things and more. For example, I look forward to seeing you all at the Fall Fellowship Festival at Kanuga on October 15! (See page 2 for more details.)

These experiences and blessings are fruits of God's bounty, and they all require us to be faithful stewards of God's gifts. While we celebrate and enjoy the abundant harvest of the past year, I hope that we, as wise, faithful, and prudent stewards see that at St. John we are "Growing by Sharing God's Gifts." Thank you for prayerfully offering what you can to support the mission of St. John in the Wilderness.

On Sunday, October 8, all furry, feathered, and scaly companions are invited to this special service in the parking lot behind the Parish House to receive a blessing. Cats, dogs, chickens, snakes, horses, goats, hamsters, bearded dragons, and all domesticated animals are welcome! Attendees may also present a stuffed animal or photo of a pet to receive a blessing. Our outdoor worship space is sure to create a lively Eucharist for all creatures involved. In the event of rain, the service will be relocated inside the Parish Hall.

Pets are an important part of family life. The Blessing of the Animals is an opportunity for parishioners and community members to express their shared connection with animals and with the God who made them all.

The Blessing of the Animals comes a few days after the annual Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, a man with a true spirit of love and peace that could have only come from God. He turned the cerebral, inward-leaning theology and scholasticism of the Middle Ages on its head with his radical commitment to living a life of poverty and service in the pattern of Jesus of Nazareth.

Those who encountered St. Francis were drawn into the peaceable Kingdom of God to know more fully the Prince of Peace. Even animals, it is said, were attracted to his Christ-like gentleness. In one story, he preaches to a flock of birds. In another, he makes peace with a wolf that had been terrorizing a village, calling the creature "Brother Wolf" and reconciling him to the village.

As we thank God for the animals in our lives, we pray that the reconciling work of Jesus Christ might extend beyond our relationship with God to include all creation. We hope you will join us with your animal companions for this fun outdoor worship service. October 2023



With our growing aging population, and without a cure anywhere on the horizon, we are called to learn all we can about a condition that will affect at least 50% of us. Join us for this three-part series with Mary Donnelly, who will help you better understand the challenges of dementia and how you can reach out to the families in your community who are living with this condition.

Mary Donnelly is a nationally recognized dementia consultant and educator from MemoryCare of Asheville. Her presentation will address the most common questions that arise about dementia and Alzheimer's: how to define it, recognize it, and accept it. The program is appropriate for adults of all ages and will offer information relevant realistic strategies for caring for those affected by this condition.




November 3: Light Perpetual by Frances Spufford

Spufford was inspired to write the novel after walking by a plaque commemorating the deaths of the 168 people whose lives were lost during the attack. Of those killed, 15 were children.






Join Us on a Holy Hike Retreat

Joan Brendle leads a multi-faceted life. A constant feature of that life is using her many talents to bring joy and encouragement to others.

Because she is unable to get out much, she streams our Sunday services. Meanwhile, her energetic mind is always alert for opportunities to serve God and His people. When she sees a need, she does what she can to fulfill it, or at least make it easier to carry.

Joanie's professional career was in interior design, and her résumé is impressive. Among her projects was the palace of King Faisal's sister—someone who could hire any designer in the world.

She has made her own apartment beautiful, cozy, and comfortable, and she wants that for others too.

For instance, she loves her home at Carolina Village, but has seen that making the decision to move to an assisted living community can be tough. She helps people work through that decision and the many that follow, using her talent and decades of design experience. Some of the toughest decisions people face are about what possessions to keep and what to let go. Joanie helps them envision what they want for their new home, so that it truly supports how they want to live.

Joanie also paints and plays piano. She puts these talents, and her bright and outgoing personality, into offering others comfort and hope. She paints angels on canvas in different sizes and colors, all with the same purpose: to be a visual reminder of God's love and care. She adds a written message on the back of these small but meaningful gifts, adding her own words of encouragement.

If she notices that a neighbor seems depressed or ill, she reaches out when the time seems right. One neighbor had been ill and wouldn't leave her apartment. One day, Joanie started playing the piano in the hallway, old songs that her neighbor would know. Soon, she noticed the woman had come into the hall, and was sitting in a recliner with her eyes closed, listening. Another time, a couple came out of their apartment and started dancing.

That's the kind of person Joanie is—she makes people want to dance! If there were ever a person who takes joy in reaching out to others, to lessen their troubles and remind them that God—and His angels—are watching over them, it is Joan Brendle.


