From the Rector's Desk

More Advent?

Did you see that Advent made the news? I was surprised when NPR featured a story a few weeks back entitled, "A longer Advent helps some Christians prepare for more than Christmas." The story explained that some Protestant Churches have extended Advent this year to provide more space for encountering God in Advent. Oftentimes, they said, it seems Advent becomes a prelude to Christmas when actually it means much more. They are saying that we are in need of more Advent.

There is no denying that stores are boundaryless when it comes to going after our money in the final weeks of the year. If ignoring the cultural line in the sand that says "No Christmas before Thanksgiving" means they can make some more money, they are glad to decorate and advertise

at any time. I honestly don't expect stores to be the keepers of our holy calendar, but I do wonder if we are capable of any restraint. I wonder if more Advent is exactly what the Good Physician orders.

One thing that Advent teaches us is that restraint can be holy. I sometimes feel that waiting is the most unAmerican thing that I do. Even though I spend a lot of time waiting for this or that, I am absolutely sure that my waiting is wrong and I should not have to do it. But in Advent, we are invited to wait. We are invited to the paradox that restraint can be holy. It's the kind of anticipation familiar to those who are expecting a child to be born: exciting and scary. It's the kind of anticipation that takes shape in the hearts of families as a loved one returns home from a longtime away. It's also the kind of humbling acceptance when we realize that we cannot fix a large and difficult problem. Instead, we are invited to sit with it and to pray.

What if this holy restraint is an end in itself? What if these weeks in December are not only about preparation for Christmas? What if we are also shaped in the journey and not just in the destination? What if God shows up in the waiting, in our restraint, in between what was before and what has not yet come to be? This Advent season, I pray that we can find restraint to be active and holy work. Lean into the waiting this month. Embrace the journey by looking around prayerfully inside and outside of your soul. Let go of the instant gratification and the boundarylessness of our culture's seasons. Ask God to sanctify your waiting.



Parishioner Spotlight: Bill Gordon



Can you remember a teacher who made a real difference in your life - one who listened to you and knew your dreams and aspirations and went beyond the duties of the classroom to help you move ahead in your life? Bill Gordon was such a teacher.

For many years he taught his own students and also teachers in many countries around the world. His wife, Worth, accompanied him on these many trips, visiting 20-25 countries during his career (Morocco being their favorite), and they both agree that much is to be learned by traveling and experiencing how others live. As an educator, he was interested in all children getting a good education and so was involved also in school desegregation, including the formation of magnet schools and bussing.

Sometimes a student of Bill's needed help. He was known to provide appropriate clothing for a job interview and even co-signed loans when necessary. When Bill saw a need, he acted on it. I believe he probably surprised some by his wonderful generosity.

Bill Gordon has been attending worship at St. John in the Wilderness since he was a child, serving as an altar boy and then president of the men's club years later, sponsoring swim parties for the youth, as well as holding positions on the vestry. Bill's Dad, Russ, was Senior Warden of our church many years ago and Bill followed in that direction, holding the positions of both Junior and Senior Warden. The one ministry Bill never ventured into was teaching formation classes in the church. I suppose he did enough of that during the work week!


