From the Rector's Desk

The Past Becomes Present in Holy Week, and We Are Saved

Holy Week begins outdoors. We gather at the Carriage Entrance with palms in our hands as shouts of jubilation spring forth from our lips: "Hosanna! Hosanna in the highest!" It is there, on those steps, that this prayer is said to begin our journey:

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP, pg 271)

Through the powerful liturgies of Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday, we are able to contemplate deeply upon God's intervention in our world and in our lives. Here the Book of Common *Prayer* doesn't speak of contemplation as simply thinking about something. We believe these liturgies somehow make Christ's saving acts present to us again. Like Jews who gather for the Seder and eat that Passover meal while standing up just as their ancestors did before the Exodus, so we believe that Christ's last meal. crucifixion, burial, and resurrection are present to us when we tell his story, eat his food. stand at the foot of his cross, and discover the one whom the tomb could not hold.

The journey nears for us this month. Indeed, God is very close. Let us enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts whereby we have been given life and immortality.






imagining of a boy whose life has been all but forgotten, and whose name was given to one of the most celebrated plays of all time.

From brilliant medical student in Edinburgh and London to eligible bachelor and quick-tempered physician in Cape Town, Dr. Perry



thrived. When he befriended the aristocratic Cape Governor, the doctor rose to the pinnacle of society, before the two were publicly accused of a homosexual affair that scandalized the colonies and nearly cost them their lives. E. J. Levy's enthralling novel, inspired by the life of Dr. James Miranda Barry, brings this captivating character vividly alive.

Backpack Program Presents Empty Bowls

Sunday, April 24, at 12:30, 5:00, & 6:00pm in the Parish Hall

For the fifth year, local pottery artists are firing their kilns to help hungry children in the greater Flat Rock area. On Sunday, April 24, Empty Bowls, a community meal benefiting the Flat Rock Backpack Program, will take place inside the Parish Hall at SJW. There are three seatings with suggested reservations at 12:30pm, 5pm, and 6pm.

Tickets are \$25 per person or \$50 for a family of two adults and children under 12 years old. Each ticket includes one hand-crafted bowl (all donated by area potters) and a soup-based meal (a variety of soups, breads, and desserts).

Tickets are now available for purchase at the Parish House Office or from Backpack team members. They can also be purchased at the door on the day of the event. For more information, call 828-693-9783. Credit cards are accepted; checks should be made out to St. John in the Wilderness noting Empty Bowls. Updated COVID-19 restrictions will be in place, and carry-out will be available for those who wish to dine elsewhere.

About the Backpack Program

The Flat Rock Backpack Program began in 2008 when parishioner Debby Staton learned that some Henderson County students were deemed "nutritionally deprived" at their homes on the weekend. Debby



pulled together a team, and together they partnered with MANNA Packs for Kids to provide food to students in our area who need it. The Backpackers are a totally volunteer group, and their funding comes from grants, private donations, and fundraisers like Empty Bowls, which provides the majority of their financial support.

Holy Week and Easter at St. John in the Wilderness

Palm Sunday - April 10 at 8:45 and 11am

From shouts of "Hosanna" to "Crucify Him"
Rite II Eucharists with the Passion Narrative according to St. Luke will begin outside with the Blessing of Palms, after which we will process into the church.

Maundy Thursday - April 14 at 7pm

"Lord, are you going to wash my feet?"

We will begin the service with the celebration of the Eucharist. Following the gospel and the homily, the service continues with the ceremony of foot washing. At the end of the service, the altar is stripped and all decorative furnishings are removed from the church in preparation for the bare altar on Good Friday.

Gethsemane Watch - April 14 and 15 "Can you stay awake for just one hour?"

After the Maundy Thursday service ends, you are invited to stay in the church to pray. On this night, we try to do what the disciples could not on the night before Jesus was crucified: stay awake for one hour and pray. The goal is to have at least one person keeping vigil the entire night, starting at the end of the Maundy Thursday service. Sign up for a shift at www.bit.ly/GethsemaneWatch.

Good Friday - April 15 - "Were you there?"

11am: We commemorate the crucifixion of Jesus beginning with the Stations of the Cross. Meet in the Parish Hall parking lot.

12 and 5:30pm: Good Friday services will be held in the church. There is no Eucharist on Good Friday.

1 until 4pm: The Veneration of the Cross will take place in the church. A large wooden cross will be brought forth and placed in the sight of the people, who are invited to spend time with the cross in devotion.

Easter Sunday - April 17 - "He is Risen!"

8:45 and 11am: Rite II Eucharists will take place in the church as we celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior.

10 until 11am: Please join us in the Rector's Garden for our annual Easter Egg Hunt!

St. John Bowls for Kids' Sake

Once again, our church stepped to the plate to raise funds for Big Brothers Big Sisters of WNC during the annual "Bowl for Kids' Sake" held at Tarheel Lanes in Hendersonville on Saturday, March 5. St. John in the Wilderness was also one of the event's 12 sponsors this year.

Bigs, Littles, and supporters united with this year's theme to "Bowl for the Future," with many participants showing up in costume. At least 20 parishioners either bowled or donated to raise almost \$1,500 from St. John in the Wilderness. The church fielded three teams, and was acknowledged for the "most money raised" by a team.

The overall goal among the 18 counties serving Western North Carolina was \$100,000, and BBBS expected to exceed that amount. The campaign continued through March, and as of March 28 had raised over \$129,000.

Every dollar raised supports BBBS of WNC's mission to create and support one-to-one mentoring relationships that ignite the power and promise of youth. BBBS selects and matches mentors with children facing adversity and provides ongoing activities, training, and support services for both families and volunteers to foster a lasting and beneficial connection. This support facilitates academic improvement, personal growth, development of life skills, and improved self-confidence for Littles as well as enriching the lives of Bigs. As this year's event theme suggests, the Big-Little relationship provides the Little with the support necessary to have a bright, successful future.




