#### From the Rector's Desk

#### Finding New Rhythms of Grace

We are supposed to switch things up during Lent. That is what the old clerics say. "Take time for silence and prayer," they instruct. "Give up sweets or alcohol, and pick up a daily devotional guide." Most of us are glad to have our own routines and rhythms. I'm not sure why we should switch it up for 40 days each year.

In church, we certainly do switch things up. All of a sudden our lips are tripping over those old *Rite I* prayers. This year we've removed the prelude and postlude organ music from Sunday worship so things are more simple and less celebratory. I sure miss saying those "A-words" already. We have added special classes, Lenten games, and a book of reflections just for you, all of which you can explore at <u>www.stjohnflatrock.org/lenten-journey</u>.

I suppose the point of taking on new things or giving up old things is not to just do something different. Switching things up is not an end in itself. It's about finding new rhythms of grace. It turns out that all of the stuff in our lives – all of the noise, the comforts, the busyness, and the plentitudes we enjoy – they actually serve to get in the way of our relationship with God more often than not.

There is a different rhythm out there that is calling to us all the time. It is, as a poet once said, "...a deep harmony thrumming in the mixture...." It is nothing less than the very drumbeat of the Kingdom which calls to us. If we can find it in Lent, then we can find it in life. I'm going to put my ear to the door to see if I can hear what is on the other side. I'm going to switch things up this Lent, and I recommend you do the same.

It is fitting, therefore, to spend time with Rowan Williams through his book, *Being Christian: Baptism, Bible, Eucharist, and Prayer*. In this little book based on lectures given by Rowan Williams during Holy Week at Canterbury Cathedral, the former Archbishop of Canterbury breaks down the faith to these four essential elements. Indeed, we are a people who have been buried and raised with Christ through baptism; we read the Scriptures; we are nourished in Christ's body and blood; and we pray that God's Kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven.

#### **"Remember the Sabbath Day to Keep It Holy"** A Lenten Learning Series with Fr. Ian Williams Tuesdays in Lent in the Wilderness Room

What does it mean to remember to or keep the Sabbath holy? How might we deepen our experience of Sabbath in worship? How might we expand our understanding of Sabbath beyond going to church regularly? How might our understanding and practice of Sabbath draw us nearer to God?

"Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" is the fourth of the Ten Commandments. With slight but important linguistic differences, the fourth commandment is found in both Exodus 20:8 and Deuteronomy 20:12. On Tuesday evenings in Lent, in the next edition of "Saintly Hors D'oeuvres," Rev. Ian Williams will lead an exploration into our understanding of the Sabbath and the concept of Sabbath rest. This Lenten formation program will draw on biblical understandings of the Sabbath as well as historical and cultural practices of observing the Sabbath. Finally, it will explore how we, in our modern contexts, may incorporate more full, meaningful, and transformative ways to remember and keep the Sabbath holy.

#### Youth Recycling Center Update Lynn Wiescholek, Sunday School Teacher

St. John's Elementary Sunday School Class gathered on Sunday afternoon, February 5, to share a light lunch and continue working on the recycling project they sponsor.

They have been collecting eyeglasses to be donated to the local Lions Club for distribution worldwide. The Sunday School Class, with the assistance of some of the older youth, delivered 42 pairs of glasses to the donation box on 5th Avenue in Hendersonville. They also taped the ends of dead single-use batteries to prevent leakage. In a team effort, they taped exactly 500 batteries that were delivered to the recycling center in February, along with four cell phones.

After an hour of steady work, the children enjoyed some fun time on St. John's playgrounds.

Our youth are committed to sustaining a clean environment and giving to those less fortunate than we. Through their recycling project they are fulfilling their promise to take care of God's gifts to us.

A huge "thank you" goes out to our parishioners for bringing in the eyeglasses and batteries. We will continue to accept both, as well as old cell phones. The collection boxes are located in the hallway between the Sunday School rooms and the Parish Hall.

#### **Preparing for an Episcopal Visitation** Fr. Josh Stephens

I am excited to share with you that our bishop, The Rt. Rev. José McLoughlin, will come to St. John on April 30th for an Episcopal Visit. He will be celebrating and preaching at both services that Sunday, as well as speaking to you during formation between the services. Although we call such occasions an "Episcopal Visitation," I was taught that we do not "welcome" our bishop as we would a guest, since St. John is one of his parishes. Indeed, I serve as your rector on behalf of Bishop José who is the chief celebrant and preacher in our diocese. Together with him and all of our Episcopal siblings in these mountains and foothills, we make up the Episcopal branch of Christ's one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church.

An Episcopal Visitation does require some preparation on our part. The clergy and staff will be planning ahead to make sure we are prepared for that special day in Eastertide. For your part, there are two things you can do to ready yourselves. First, continue to pray for the Church throughout the world, including our bishop and the church in Western North Carolina. Look forward to spending time with Bishop José who embodies in his person our lineage with the open to hearing the Gospel apostles. Be proclaimed by him and receiving his episcopal blessing.

Secondly, please let Sarah in the office know if you would like to be confirmed, received, or reaffirmed by the bishop during his visit by signing up at bit.ly/bishopsjw. While any baptized person can join the parish of St. John, a further step in faith and communion happens when we are blessed by the bishop through the

laying on of hands. If you have not been baptized or confirmed, then Bishop José can baptize and/or confirm you as an Episcopalian.


If you were baptized in another tradition or confirmed in another tradition, you may be received into the Episcopal Church in the same way. Lastly, if your spiritual journey has led to a need for you to publicly reaffirm your faith to start anew or claim who you are as God's beloved, you can be reaffirmed by the Bishop at this same service.

While no class is required to join St. John, we do require a class for the mature commitments of faith as described above. With this in mind, we are offering a class during formation on Sundays during Lent (March 12, 19, & 26) which will serve the necessary catechism for becoming as Episcopalian. You can sign up for this class at bit.ly/beingchristian.

As I say often, it is a gift to be Christ's Church with you. I hope you will consider taking a deeper step

into the faith during the upcoming Episcopal Visitation if the above applies to you. Please let

the office know if you have any questions.





## March 3: *Flight Behavior* by Barbara Kingsolver

*Flight Behavior* is a brilliant and suspenseful novel set in present-day Appalachia; a breathtaking parable of catastrophe and denial that explores how the complexities we inevitably encounter in life lead us to believe in our particular chosen truths. Kingsolver's riveting story concerns a young wife and mother on a failing farm in rural Tennessee who experiences something she cannot explain, and how her discovery energizes various competing factions,

trapping her in the center of the conflict and ultimately opening up her world.



#### April 7: A Woman of No Importance

In 1942, the Gestapo sent out an urgent transmission: "She is the most dangerous of all Allied spies. We must find and destroy her." The target was Virginia Hall, a Baltimore socialite who talked her way into Special Operations Executive, the spy organization dubbed Churchill's "Ministry of Ungentlemanly Warfare." She became the first Allied woman deployed behind enemy lines and-despite her prosthetic leg-helped to light the flame of the French Resistance,

revolutionizing secret warfare as we know it. Based on new and extensive research, Sonia Purnell has for the first time uncovered the full secret life of Virginia Hall--an astounding and inspiring story of heroism, spycraft, resistance, and personal triumph over shocking adversity.


We proudly boxed up and sent the robes to Robe Gifting International in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. We sent along a message offering prayers for the good work of the


